President's Message



The motto and logo that I selected for the 2013-2014 League year, was **ONE** but in looking back I think it should have been **CHANGE**. As a League, we have and are continuing to undergo significant change this year. The intent of these changes is to better align ourselves with the direction of Association of Junior Leagues International (AJLI), improve member engagement, and continue to grow in the community. In order to move forward, many times we are looking back and re-implementing things of the past that brought great value to our League. Here are just some of the things that underwent change this year:

- **Board of Directors**: The current Board of Directors has been split into two pilot Boards in 2014-2015, the Executive Board and Administrative Board.
 - **Executive Board** consists of President, President-Elect, Immediate Past President, Sustaining Mentor, VP Finance, VP Administration, and Recording Secretary. This Board is empowered with the long term 3-5+ year strategic direction of the League and JLP's leadership presence in the community.
 - Administrative Board is comprised of the leaders of each committee and chaired by the VP Administration. This Board is tasked with the day to day function and execution of the League's mission.

Fundraising

Julep's Closet: After 67 years, the shuttering of the sale was moved forward to 2014 rather than the original 2016 timeline due to the low revenue per volunteer man-hour invested.

Pair Up for Health: After 4 years, the race is not being held in 2013 or beyond due to lack of profitability. **Frolic with the Fairies**: Sold out one week before the event with 1,600 tickets!

Superhero Saturday is back! A new boy friendly fundraiser is being launched November 2014. This event will provide the same spectacular level of experience that Frolic does year after year.

Community

- **2013 Storm Relief**: Our members raised \$13,000 in financial and ware donations for our T,H, &L partners and members who lost their home in the storms.
- **Kids in the Kitchen**: Continued to grow its partnership with Quest Charter Academy with an afterschool program once per month being delivered.
- **CRPD**: Five proposed Impact areas were presented to members. In fall 2015 we will narrow to one Impact area to pursue after the Peoria PlayHouse Children's Museum opens.

Membership

- **Membership Expectations**: A point based system has replaced the previous membership requirements. Points are required to be earned in every facet of the League, no longer only in fundraising.
- 2 New Member Classes! The dual Fall and Spring new member class was brought back with 37 new members. The Spring class was reinitiated due to so much community interest in our League that did not want to wait until August to join!

Communication

New Website: Our website got a new format and look!

Volunteer management software: Closerware was implemented for use among our members to give the ability to sign-up and RSVP for volunteer opportunities online.

So many changes this year! These should position us to grow and prosper as we continue the Junior League of Peoria's legacy in our community.

Thank you for the honor and privilege of serving as your 2013-2014 President for our 77th League year. Thank you to my husband for supporting the many meetings, evening and weekend hours that were spent on JLP. Thank you to my Board of Directors for enduring the long, long meetings that it took to drive change in our organization. Thank you to the members, active and sustaining, that supported the League through its changes, activities, and great events all League year long.

Frolic with the Fairies

Frolic with the Fairies Mother Daughter Tea was once again the talk of the town this past March. As the Junior League of Peoria's top fundraising event, it has quickly turned into an annual tradition for many of its returning guests. This year's event was held on Friday, March 7th and Saturday, March 8th at the Par-A-Dice Hotel Ballroom. The theme for the year was *Frolic with the Fairies Enchanted Forest*.



The event started six years ago as a Mother Daughter

Tea hosted at the Junior League's headquarters, the Balance Herschel House. While the first tea served just over 100 guests, the event has quickly become a sought after occasion to attend in the Peoria Community. The Saturday tea included three tea times at 9:00am, 12:30pm, and 4:00pm. Due to the popularity of the event a fourth tea, catering to more mature fairies was held on Friday evening.

Emilie Egan, Committee Co-Chair, said that almost 1,600 guests attended this year's festivities.

Frolic with the Fairies has become an event that is looked forward to year after year by League members as well as the community. Guests even travel from as far as Bloomington, Springfield and the Chicago Area to attend.

According to Christina Walker, Lead Decorator, "*The look on the little fairies' faces as they enter the magical ballroom full of whimsy and delight is something that you will never forget.*" This year the Junior League of Peoria oversaw all of the décor for the event and created a whimsical experience by turning the ballroom into an enchanted forest complete with 10 foot tall trees and a waterfall.

The event kicked off Friday night with the First Annual Friday Night Frolic. Attendees were treated to performances by Cornerstone Dance Academy, a Fairy Etiquette Lesson, Rock'n Runway Style Show, Hip Hop Dance Lesson and a DJ Dance Party. According to Kendra Sipes, Committee Co-Chair, *The Friday Night Frolic was created to accommodate some of our more mature fairies that still want to participate in the special event but are feeling a little too old for the entertainment and dressing up in costume.*"

Saturday's tea times kicked off with the much anticipated Fairy Style Show. The attendees were given the



opportunity to sign up their daughters to walk in the style show. After each of their models had their hair styled by Objet D'Art Hair Salon, they got to strut their stuff on the runway while special remarks were read about them.

The event was topped off with a performance by award winning children's singer and song writer, Julie K. Julie K's performance had the children and adults alike, up out of their seats singing and dancing along. In addition to Julie K, the event also included several performances by the Cornerstone Academy of Inspired Arts as well as guest appearances by the Peoria Metro Pageant winners.

This year just over \$27,000 was raised at the event from ticket sales, raffles sales, advertisers and sponsors. All net proceeds from Frolic with the Fairies go towards the Junior League of Peoria at its work to build a better community.

Kids in the Kitchen

Junior League of Peoria's Kids in the Kitchen has been hard at work this year expanding our program at Quest Academy. This year we expanded on the number of opportunities for sessions with the students as well as focused on our outcomes and impact.

During this school year, we educated students through various sessions at Quest Academy. For the first session in September, the students learned about the sugar content of com-



mon foods, how to read food labels, and basic rules of the kitchen. During the second session, the students enjoyed talking about healthy snacks, making trail mix, and tasting different types of apples. In November, the students participated in a yoga session led by Kirsten Hedden, Director of Yoga at Senara, who also talked about the importance of staying active during the cold winter months. For the January session, we had wonderful guests from Broad Branch Farm. This was by far a favorite session for the students! The students got their hands on some organic vegetables and made their own salad with dressing. The students also sampled some organic vegetable soup and learned about the importance of quality nutrition. To finish the year, we baked up a healthy recipe with students in April and we took a field trip to Hyvee in May, where we received a tour of the store by a dietician.



In the month of March, we submitted a grant application to Kashi with the hopes that they will help support our efforts in Peoria. We have really focused on measuring the impact of our program and the outcomes of the students in our program at Quest Academy. We are continually looking for opportunities in the community and at the national level to support expansion of the Kids in the Kitchen program.

Regarding the annual Girl Scout event, we had a comprehensive day planned for Brownies and Juniors to each earn a badge. However, we had to cancel the event this year

due to weather. The event will hopefully be rescheduled for next fall during better weather! Thank you to everyone for you hard work and commitment this year for planning the event!

Terror & Hope

On November 17, 2013, our community was hit with the most devastating natural disaster in recent memory. The tornado impacted thousands in the Peoria area, including three members of the Junior League of Peoria who lost their homes. Within two days the Junior League had put together an ad-hoc committee . Thousands of dollars worth of diapers, toys, toiletries and gift cards were collected to help our members get back on their feet. Here are their stories:

Amy Moore, an Active Member of Junior League saw first-hand how JLP can come together to help one of their own. Amy, who was home at the time of the storm, was huddled in the basement with her husband, daughter, and their dog, as the tornado passed over and destroyed their home. After getting out of the basement and assessing the situation, she knew that their home was most likely totally destroyed and they would have to rebuild.

In the days following the storm, the most important thing was salvaging everything that they could from the house. On "moving day," she sent out a Facebook message around 5am saying that they would be at the house and could use as many hands as she could get. On such short

notice, over 20 JLP members and friends were there to help Amy get everything her and her family could from the house.

As you know, Junior League of Peoria quickly banded together and began collecting gift cards, clothes, diapers, and toiletries. Because Amy was so overwhelmed with bigger things – salvaging things from her home, dealing with insurance companies, and finding a new place to live, it was the little things that seemed to be forgotten. When the Moore's moved into their temporary apartment, Amy went to BHH to pick up some of the supplies that had been donated. She was able to pick up clothes/diapers, and as she was looking at the supplies, she realized – "my apartment didn't even have toilet paper, but someone had thought enough to bring some to the BHH."

While so many people were willing to help Amy right after the storm hit, she realizes that the future is still going to require even more help, and many members of JLP have already told her to call whenever they need something. Even though the Moore's are still trying to figure it out, there are things that Amy knows she will need in the future including: baby-sitting while rebuilding and of course, assistance when they are ready to move into their house.

When asked to describe how being a member of JLP benefitted her during one of the most difficult experiences of her life, Amy said, "I joined Junior League of Peoria to meet people and get involved. Through this experience, I have realized that JLP is not JUST a service organization, but we really have each other's backs."



Becky Taylor was also at home on November 17th, with her 2 year old and her 4 year old sons. That day, the boys were supposed to have a playdate with some friends, so she was making lunch earlier than usual for them, planning to put them down for their naps shortly after. As she was making their grilled cheese, her phone started buzzing. Thinking it was her mom sending her a text, Becky checked her phone and saw that there was a Tornado Warning. She looked out the back window, and saw it was a nice sunny day. She ignored the warning and continued cooking. Her 2 year old, however, was looking out a different window and kept saying "Uh oh." She looked to see what he was looking at and realized the severity of the matter. Becky told the boys they were going to have a picnic in the basement and led everyone down the stairs.

When they got down to the basement, she ran back upstairs to get the boys ketchup, and when she returned to the basement, Becky immediately heard a really loud roaring noise. She grabbed the boys and went into the bedroom in the basement, and as soon as they got there they started hearing the crashing of their things all around them. Thankfully, the bedroom they had run into was the only room in the house that wasn't impacted, and in fact, the window was the only window in the house that was not broken.

After the tornado hit, the only person she was able to call was her mother-in-law, and all she could say was the tornado had hit their house, but they were ok, and then the phones went dead. Her husband immediately went to the airport and was on a flight home as quickly as possible.

When the tornado was over, the toughest thing for Becky and her boys was that they didn't even have socks or shoes on. When a first responder came, he had to pry open her closet to get her a pair of shoes, and a neighbor brought over a coat so that they could stand on it as they waited for a friend to come and pick them up.

Susan D. Gorman recalls the events in her own words:

Our home of forty-two years was destroyed by an EF-4 tornado on Sunday morning, November 17, 2013. My husband, John, and I were home when the sirens began going off – first on my phone, and then the city sirens. We had gone to church the night before. That warm morning, I awoke to see sunlight coming through the windows moments before I heard the sirens. John came into the bedroom where I was just waking up to tell me that there were storms around our city. I got up, put on my bathrobe, and walked through the dining room and the kitchen and seven steps down to the family room. He turned on the weather on the TV just as I came down the last step and asked, "Are there storms around here?"

At that same moment, I heard the infamous freight train noise and heard the windows blast out a few feet away. I screamed and ran into the concrete block shower in the laundry room and began praying, "Please don't let us die" over and over again. I realized that John had not come into the shower with me. I screamed his name twice before he came running in, put his arms around me just as our house exploded all around us without touching us. When the tornado passed, there was perfect stillness. We walked into the family room and looked upstairs into what was once the kitchen and saw the sky. Our lives would never be the same again.



These members will continue to need help throughout the next year and we are committed to keeping in contact with them as they work to rebuild their homes. Thank you to all of you who have helped by donating your time and money.
